Please read Ps. 1:4-6. This describes those who do not obey the Lord. Scoffers express contempt, jeering, and mockery. Many times we think the ungodly are really successful, but God is the judge. Remember, rain falls on both the just and the unjust, and God is the final judge. Those we spend time with can affect our happiness and success.

Sermon: The Importance of Forgiveness

Scripture: Matthew 18:21-22

²¹Then came Peter to him, and said, Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times? ²²Jesus saith unto him, I say not unto thee, Until seven times: but, Until seventy times seven.

Outline

- I. Scripture requires continual forgiveness.
 - A. 70 x 7 is 490. This equals 1440 minutes a day. When divided by 60, forgiveness is every 2 to 3 minutes.
 - 1. There is nothing legalistic or magical about 70 x 7 or 490.
 - 2. Could be interpreted as forgiveness has no boundaries; there is no end to forgiveness.
 - 3. Leave no room for grudges and bitterness.
 - B. How much forgiveness is required? Lk. 7:40-50.
 - 1. Do not forgive with prejudice, partiality, or by what benefit comes from man through forgiveness.
 - 2. If a person forgives little, they love little.
 - 3. Love by choice not by circumstance.
 - > This comes from the heart.
 - ➤ To operate in God's Grace and to receive His Grace, remember the authority and Kingship of Jesus.

 - 1. Wounded for our transgressions our substitute.

The Importance of Forgiveness

Consider This:

Be careful how we speak to others. It is important to reconcile immediately, as conflict causes greater problems when it is not resolved. Forgive others as you spend time in daily prayer.

Notes:		

- V. Unforgiveness results in a "root of bitterness".
 - A. Results in every kind of evil thing James 3:13-18
 - 1. Bitter heart Prov. 14:10-11.
 - Our heart is either heavy or joyful.
 - 2. Be careful of quick temper and foolish acts Prov. 16:16-32.
 - > We must not continue in a carnal fashion.
 - 3. Conflicts come to damage relationships.
 - B. Respond and do not react.
 - 1. Take time to seek God and pray when opportunities for anger arise. Do not let the sun go down... Eph. 4:21-27.
 - 2. We must examine ourselves to see what part we may have caused.
 - 3. Release the person and forgive them as God forgives us Jn. 20:21-23.
 - ➤ Unforgiveness activates our sin nature and will begin to rule over us.
 - Wisdom from above proclaims Christ and the Cross.
 - ➤ When we receive Jesus as Lord and Savior, our sins are forgiven.
 - ➤ However, if we reject Salvation, our sins remain.

The Importance of Forgiveness

Consider This:

When we forgive we release ourselves as well as those with whom we are angry; what they choose to do with the release is up to them. Holding onto anger only causes it to grow. There is a truth that says—"Do not nurse it and rehearse it, because if we do we will never reverse it." We must correct our own fault before we can correct others; we must forgive ourselves for our part in the situation.

"Work on yourself for yourself. The only person you can be better than today is the person you were yesterday." Quote by Christopher Goneau "CJ"

The World, the Flesh, and the Devil

Consider This:

The world system and its values often seem to offer opportunities and pleasure. Many times the believer is drawn away from God's will for his/her life. This drawing away causes separation from God. These opportunities and pleasures are only there for an instant or short season of time. Two major things to heed are what you listen to and what you follow.

Notes:		

- II. The Flesh Mk. 14:38.
 - A. In Scripture represents:
 - 1. Carnal nature.
 - 2. Sinful principle Gal. 5:19-21 lists such types of sinfulness.
 - 3. God opposes such nature.
 - B. Flesh is not eradicated for the Christian, however:
 - 1. He/she does not have to obey the flesh Rom. 6:1-6.
 - 2. Christians possess a new nature empowered by the Holy Spirit (Spiritual Transformation) Rom. 6:6, Col. 3:5-15.
 - C. Flesh and Spirit are totally opposed to each other Carnal nature is not in line with God's Spirit.
 - 1. The one which dominates will be in charge therefore be careful of your focus.
 - 2. Christians must acknowledge salvation by the Name of Jesus who nullified the power of sin by His shed blood, death, and resurrection Acts 4:11-12, Rom. 1:15-17, 6:4-14.
 - 3. Solution is in living under the control of the Spirit Col. 3:12-17.
 - ➤ Put on the Fruit of the Spirit, do all in the Name of the Lord Jesus and see how the view changes. Gal. 5:22-25.

The World, the Flesh, and the Devil

Consider This:

When we are saved we have a new nature. However we must develop a relationship with the Lord. It will take commitment and does not happen automatically. We still have a free will, allowing us choose how we think and how we spend our time. We do have the mind of Christ (Phil. 2:5); however we must choose to use it. We are to put off the old nature and put on the new.

III. The Devil/Satan

- A. Role of Satan
 - 1. Accuser of the brethren.
 - 2. Adversary opposed to the work of God.
 - a. Mk. 4:14-19
 - b. Job 2:2-7
 - 3. Promotes division and defiance among mankind.
- B. Expelled from Heaven Isa. 14:12-15.
 - 1. Satan's defeat has been secured by Jesus's death on the cross and His resurrection Lk. 10:18-20.
 - 2. Continues to hinder God's program; Whom he may devour, what we are willing to allow? I Pet. 5:6-9.
- C. Has hierarchy of spirits and principalities Eph. 6:11-12.
 - 1. Our enemy is not human, however Satan and his hierarchy work through people.
 - 2. Our defense is the Armor of God, being steeped in the Word of God.
 - ➤ We must stand and proceed on the Truth of the Word.
 - ➤ The enemy attacks us, not because of us, but because of the Word in us. However, God sets the boundaries for our own good.
 - ➤ We must resist the devil and the Word tells us "he will flee..."

The World, the Flesh, and the Devil

Consider This:

The parable of the sower, a story to illustrate a spiritual truth, in Mk. 4:1-9 is a core message. It illustrates that the Gospel will meet with different levels of success with those who hear it. The more we study the Word and resist the devil, the more success we will have in God's plan for our lives. This is according to James 4:6-8. Many times when things go wrong or are difficult, we blame the devil, circumstances, and situations. Instead we really need to consider our thoughts and actions.

Notes:		

Sermon: Process of Change

Scripture: Romans 12:1-3

¹I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. ²And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God. ³For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith.

Outline

- I. Requires renewing our mind.
 - A. Christ washes us with the water of the Word Eph. 5:26,27.
 - B. We must agree with God and yield to Him Eph. 5:8-21.
- II. Change of thoughts and speech will result in change of action.
 - A. Be strong and of good courage Josh. 1:5-9.
 - 1. Requires inner strength Hab. 3:17-19, Ps. 18:1-3, 28:6-9, 46:1-2, Isa. 26:4
 - 2. Requires courage Deut. 31:6-8
 - a. Acknowledge and rely on God's strength and provision.
 - b. Trust in God's presence as He is always with us.
 - B. Obey without murmuring Phil. 2:12-18.
 - ➤ Be content in your Salvation, not constantly arguing with God's guidance.

Process of Change

Consider This:

Many times situations and circumstances move us toward negativity, murmuring, and complaining. These are the times we need to praise and worship the Lord; stand still, and see these situations and circumstances change.

Notes:		

- III. Identify attitudes that need change.
 - A. Negativity blocks the positive thought process.
 - B. Anxiety and stress can bring on illness.
 - C. Fear, doubt, and unbelief are against the Word and are sins.
 - D. Unforgiveness both blocks our blessings and paralyzes us.
- IV. Reverse attitudes that need change.
 - A. Be willing to acknowledge these problems and address them. This is especially important in ministry.
 - 1. Prayer Mat. 17:19-21, 20:20-21, Rom. 12:9-12.
 - 2. Fasting Acts 13:1-3, Ps. 35:13.
 - B. Give the attitudes to God.
 - 1. Reinforce and redirect thinking.
 - We must choose to do this.
 - 2. Positive self-talk who are you in Christ, knowing the truth of the Word comes from Holy Spirit (Spirit of Truth) Jn. 16:12-15.
 - 3. Be reassured of God's faithfulness, mercy, forgiveness, and love Beatitudes Mat. 5:1-12, Eph. 2:4-5, Col. 2:10-16, I Jn. 1:8-9.
 - ➤ Jesus is the true Light and that light is available to each and every person.
 - As we choose to believe, God's ways are revealed to us.

Process of Change

Consider this:

Just think of all the opportunities we encounter daily to choose positively or negatively. We can choose to obey or disobey; believe or not; rejoice or be dispirited love or hate. It is important to understand we have free will to choose; we are not robots. The Lord is there for us and Holy Spirit is there to direct us. We must choose each day whom we will serve.

Process of Change

Consider This:

Many times we impose past attitudes and actions on present circumstances, challenges, and trials. This will not work. We must see ourselves changed and moving from one glory to another. We must verbalize (inward and outward) and encourage ourselves and see us as God sees us.

Consider This:

In the Book of Job we find that God allowed Satan to put Job to several tests. We understand we do have trials and tests to cause us to grow in faith. I Pet. 1:1-9 we do not rejoice for the test or trial, but for God's grace and mercy that is multiplied to us through our trials and tests. It is important that we realize that we are not mere human beings walking through this temporal life. We must recognize that we are spirit beings created in God's image and we are sojourners here in earth suits that are only temporary. We must look beyond the day to day physical walk.

Overcoming Temptation

Consider This:

Did we work and earn our advancement with humility and thankfulness? Or did we get there stepping on others? Remember the fall of the prideful is great! In Gal. 5:16 we are commanded to walk in the Spirit; we see if we do that we will express the Fruit of the Spirit (v 22-25). We are told to work out our salvation (Phil. 2:12). II Thess. 3 instructs us concerning work and behavior. If we stay out of the business of others, avoiding greed and covetousness, paying attention to our own walk, we will be blest and have peace.

We are not qualified to judge ourselves, much less others. Sometimes we feel our conscience will acquit us and find us not guilty. We must give careful consideration to our walk in the Lord – so it is best to mind our own business and leave others to the Lord. The Lord will never leave us or forsake us. The Word of God is trustworthy. God is not a man that He should lie. We can expect the Lord to care for us, protect us, and to bring us to an expected end. We need to believe God's Word and live a life that pleases God. Always give God's Word priority.

Bonus Sermon: Set in Series for Study and Teaching

The title of the series: "The Battleground, The Holy Ground, or the Balcony", reviews three major positions which believers experience. We all have these experiences as we sojourn here on earth. Let us examine these three positions.

The Battleground. It is our daily walk; the experiences and challenges we have including victories, disappointments, etc. Every believer is on the battleground daily. It is true that Jesus has won the battle and victory is ours, but we must walk in the Word to enjoy it. The battleground is not just for the five-fold minister, but for the teacher, lawyer, merchant; and as the saying goes 'doctors, lawyers, Indian Chiefs.' It does not matter where we live, man or woman, boy or girl, rich or poor. The battleground is our individual walk, though we all need corporate prayer to help us.

The Holy Ground. It keeps us filled with the Word and suited in God's Armor. It is our protection so we can withstand the assaults of the enemy as we sojourn on the battleground. The Holy Ground is the time we spend alone with God in prayer and meditation. It is the time we review our day and examine ourselves. We may need to repent for areas of omission, commission, reaction, words, etc. We also give thanks for the success and guidance of the Lord. The Holy ground is where we speak our petitions, listen for His Voice, and rest in Him with thanksgiving and praise. I Pet 5:6-10

⁶Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time: ⁷Casting all your care upon him; for he careth for you. ⁸Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion,

walketh about, seeking whom he may devour: ⁹Whom resist stedfast in the faith, knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world. ¹⁰But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you.

The Balcony is the position we find ourselves in when we neglect the Holy Ground. If we go from day to day, from "battle to battle", without spending alone time with God, we become vulnerable to the enemy. I Pet. 5:8 says the adversary goes about seeking whom he may devour. The key is "may." The enemy can only devour us if we allow it by not having a daily diet of the Word. The balcony takes us on a downward spiral until we must make a choice to repent and return to the Holy Ground. Sometimes we end up on the balcony due to pride, neglect, ignorance, etc.

We, as humans, work physically and mentally and are active in the natural realm. We must take in food and water daily. We need time to rest. This is a visual example of the spiritual Battleground, Holy Ground, and the Balcony. If we work without food, water, or rest it will lead us to illness and eventually death. The same is true in the spirit realm. We must live up to our potential for God (the battleground), spend time with God (the Holy Ground), and avoid the Balcony. In addition, we must fellowship with those who are like-minded. Read Heb. 10:22-25 "...not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together..."

Sermon: Battleground, Holy Ground, or Balcony, Part 1

Scripture: II Samuel 11:1,2

¹And it came to pass, after the year was expired, at the time when kings go forth to battle, that David sent Joab, and his servants with him, and all Israel; and they destroyed the children of Ammon, and besieged Rabbah. But David tarried still at Jerusalem. ²And it came to pass in an eveningtide, that David arose from off his bed, and walked upon the roof of the king's house: and from the roof he saw a woman washing herself; and the woman was very beautiful to look upon.

Outline

- I. Where was David? II Sam. 11:1
 - A. He stayed at Jerusalem.
 - 1. He sent his army to battle.
 - 2. He did not lead them.
 - B. David vacated his duty to lead II Sam. 11:2.
 - 1. He viewed his kingdom from the roof of his house.
 - a. He put himself in a vulnerable position.
 - b. David saw a beautiful woman bathing.
 - 2. David left God's Divine Restraint.
 - a. Temptation was attractive.
 - b. David pursued the temptation.
 - ➤ Kings go forth to battle...he should have been leading his army.
 - David's army was victorious, yet he still stayed at Jerusalem.

Consider This:

We see in this scripture a failure of a man described as being "after God's own heart." This lesson shows us that no one is exempt from temptation and restraint from sin comes only from obedience to the Word of God.

Notes:		

- II. David sent for Bathsheba II Sam. 11:3-4.
 - A. She is the wife of Uriah.
 - 1. Uriah is one of David's mighty men.
 - 2. The messenger sent to bring Bathsheba to David.
 - B. David laid with Bathsheba.
 - 1. This is an act of grave immorality.
 - 2. Bathsheba follows the ceremonial act of purification and returns to her house.
- III. Bathsheba conceives and is with child II Sam. 11:5.
 - A. She sends for David.
 - 1. Her penalty could be death.
 - 2. David has sinned against God Ps. 51:4.
 - B. David does not repent immediately.
 - 1. If David had repented God would have forgiven him, as is God's Nature.
 - 2. Forgiveness comes only with true repentance.
 - ➤ All sin is against God, however all sin has consequences and leaves a residue.
 - ➤ David's sin affected his family, Uriah, Bathsheba, their families, and the Nation of Israel for generations to come.

Consider This:

David's sin, as sin does, involved others besides himself. No blame should be attached to Bathsheba, though she could have been put to death. She was ordered to come to David and he was King. David held her life in his hands. We must be careful about finger pointing and judgment.

Notes:		

Sermon: Battleground, Holy Ground, or Balcony, Part 2

Scripture: II Samuel 11:6-8

⁶And David sent to Joab, saying, Send me Uriah the Hittite. And Joab sent Uriah to David. ⁷And when Uriah was come unto him, David demanded of him how Joab did, and how the people did, and how the war prospered. ⁸And David said to Uriah, Go down to thy house, and wash thy feet. And Uriah departed out of the king's house, and there followed him a mess of meat from the king.

Outline

- I. David plans to cover his sin.
 - A. Deception and manipulation always leads to a slippery slope.
 - 1. David sends for Uriah, Bathsheba's husband (v6,7).
 - 2. David begins a bigger circle of involving others in his sin.
 - B. The cover up Plan A
 - 1. David tells Uriah to go home and rest. Why? Take some time off (v8)
 - 2. Uriah would be home with Bathsheba and sleep with her.
 - David's reaction is of his "carnal nature."
 - ➤ He yields to suggestions from the enemy.
 - Our mind is the battleground between God's will and Satan's deception.

Consider this:

All things, both positive and negative, have a progression. In this case, David is in a difficult position. He slept with Bathsheba and she gets pregnant. Now what does he do? He gets Uriah home to sleep with her. There is no paternity test. The slope gets steeper and more slippery.

Notes:		

- II. The cover up "Plan A" does not work II Sam. 11:9-11.
 - A. Uriah does not go home (v 9-10).
 - 1. Why does he sleep at the King's door? (v 11)
 - 2. He will not go home because his troops are sleeping in the fields.
 - B. Further progression of manipulation and deception "Plan B"
 - 1. David has Uriah stay at Jerusalem.
 - 2. David calls Uriah to join him and eat and drink. Uriah (even drunk) still does not go home.
 - C. "Plan C" David arranges Uriah's death.
 - 1. David writes a letter to Joab (general of David's troops) to place Uriah on the front line.
 - 2. Uriah carries the letter to Joab.
 - D. David marries Bathsheba.
 - 1. Bathsheba mourns Uriah's death.
 - 2. David then takes her as his wife.
 - Uriah did not know what the letter contained.
 - ➤ Joab placed Uriah at the front of the battle.
 - ➤ Uriah is killed the sin has become cold-blooded murder.

Consider This:

David has broken two of God's Commandments, six ("Thou shalt not kill") Ex. 20:13 and seven ("Thou shalt not commit adultery") Ex 20:14. Think how many times we get ourselves into a "mess." We try desperately to get out of these situations, but the only way out is through God.

Sermon: Battleground, Holy Ground, or Balcony, Part 3

Scripture: II Samuel 12:1-6

¹And the LORD sent Nathan unto David. And he came unto him, and said unto him, There were two men in one city; the one rich, and the other poor.
²The rich man had exceeding many flocks and herds: ³But the poor man had nothing, save one little ewe lamb, which he had bought and nourished up: and it grew up together with him, and with his children; it did eat of his own meat, and drank of his own cup, and lay in his bosom, and was unto him as a daughter. ⁴And there came a traveller unto the rich man, and he spared to take of his own flock and of his own herd, to dress for the wayfaring man that was come unto him; but took the poor man's lamb, and dressed it for the man that was come to him. ⁵And David's anger was greatly kindled against the man; and he said to Nathan, As the LORD liveth, the man that hath done this thing shall surely die: ⁶And he shall restore the lamb fourfold, because he did this thing, and because he had no pity.

Outline

- I. The reckoning is coming.
 - A. God sends the Prophet Nathan to David.
 - B. That which was covered was uncovered; that which was hidden was revealed.
 - ➤ Earlier, Nathan brought David news that, through his lineage, the Messiah would come. Read II Sam. 7.
 - ➤ How quickly things change. In II Sam. 12:9-12 Nathan brings the news that "the sword shall not depart from thine house". David had sinned against God. See Ps. 51:3-4.
 - ➤ The penalties affected many people, especially David's family. The father's sins move on to future generations.

Consider this:

Sometimes, we feel sure we can cover up, but sooner or later exposure comes. Even as sin progresses, it will eventually fail and we will be "naked" before God. He does not excuse the sin of His anointed any more than He would a pagan (unbeliever).

Notes:		

- II. David Truly Repents Ps. 51
 - A. David tells Nathan "I have sinned against the LORD" II Sam. 12:13.
 - 1. David realizes the injury done to God.
 - 2. God has already forgiven David's sin, but this does not relieve the penalty for the sin.
 - 3. Confession follows conviction and brings God's compassion Ps. 51:1-3.
 - 4. Communion with God is restored.
 - B. Penalty is passed II Sam. 12:10-12.
 - 1. David sinned secretly, but God revealed it openly.
 - 2. The penalty was fulfilled with the murder of David's son Amnon II Sam. 13:28-31.
 - 3. Absalom's rebellion and death follows II Sam. 18:14-15.
 - 4. Also, the baby of Bathsheba, Uriah's wife, dies.
 - ➤ Death and destruction follows David's family.
 - Murder/Rape
 - Rebellion/Deception
 - Evil produces evil

Consider this:

The penalty for David's sin and the consequences that followed were horrendous. Truly, the sword never left David's house. God forgives and His Arms are open to us. However our actions affects others and has a continuing ripple effect. We need to pray and consider our words and deeds to avoid "balcony" experiences.

Notes:		

Bonus Sermon: Balcony Examples for Further Study

- Abraham losing faith. He said his wife, Sarah, was his sister. God intervened avoiding certain disaster. – Gen. 20.
- Esau sold Jacob his birthright for a meal and paid for it for a lifetime – Gen. 25. Jacob deceived his brother and, in turn, reaped deception – Gen. 27.
- Moses in his frustration he disobeyed God and struck "The Rock" twice, when he was told to "speak to The Rock." – Num. 20:11 Moses was still God's man, but he never entered the Promised Land – Deut. 32.
- Samson followed his carnal nature, lost his strength, and was blind; however, God still used him Judg. 16.
- Elijah a mighty prophet of God gave into fear. He ran from Queen Jezebel and ended up in a cave. His mantle passed to Elisha I Ki. 19.
- Jonah being angry at Nineveh, disobeyed God and had a "whale" of a balcony experience Jonah 1.
- Peter denied Jesus 3 times. He repented and wept Mat. 26.
- Judas betrayed Jesus and overcome by guilt and shame, he committed suicide Mat. 27.
- Ananias and Sapphira lied to the Holy Spirit and suffered sudden death Acts 5.

Bonus Sermon Further Study

Consider this:

In studying the various balcony experiences you will find that each situation or circumstance has a penalty, some greater than others. Why is that the case? We must consider the circumstances and the magnitude of the effects. Ask yourself: was the "sin" premeditated? Did it involve murder, adultery, and other things listed in — Gal. 5:19-21?

Sin progresses and is not simple; it is complicated. There are words like hamartia (Greek) meaning to "miss the mark." This is the case found in Rom. 3:23 "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." Then there is the word transgression which means to exceed the boundaries of God. He has certain boundaries for our life. Also, we have iniquity which means gross injustice. Iniquity cannot be condoned. You cannot excuse it and there is no apology for it. As you study, find the answers to these questions. May God richly bless you as you study to show yourself approved – II Tim. 2:15.

Have You Received Jesus?

Is Jesus your Lord and Savior? If you have not accepted Him, please realize that Scripture tells us "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23).

I Jn. 5:13 gives an example to base our faith. "These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; that ye may know that ye have eternal life, and ye may believe on the name of the Son of God."

What if you are just not sure? Rom. 10:9-10 gives you the Scripture for becoming born-again. "That if thou shall confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thin heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto Salvation." Take some time to consider this very carefully. Ask Jesus to come into your heart so that you will know the power of His Salvation and make your statement of faith today.

If you do not know what to say, consider this simple prayer.

"Lord, I know that I need a savior. I believe that Jesus died on the Cross for my sins and God raised Him from the dead. I ask to be forgiven and for Jesus to come into my heart and be the Lord of my life. I believe now by faith that God has heard my prayer and I am born-again."

If you have prayed this prayer, accept by faith that your sins have been forgiven. It is important to tell someone you decided to accept the Lord. Also, our recommendation is for you join a local church with like-minded people. Then go to the next step – water baptism (see Rom. 6)

Have You Received Jesus?

Once you become born-again, it is your responsibility to renew your mind with the Word of God. Rom. 12:1-2 tells us that transformation of the mind can only take place in this temporal world by the Word of God. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God."

May God grant you knowledge, understanding, and wisdom in all of His ways.
